# Bike, Pedestrian, Car Safety

Several neighbors have had serious biking accidents in the past 7 months. We wish them fast and complete recovery! Its a good time to remember that walkers, bikers and drivers must ALL be extra careful to prevent accidents.



#### Walkers

Remember to walk facing traffic when you can't walk on a sidewalk. This protects everyone. Cars, bicyclists, and pedestrians can share the road and the trail, but only when they respect each other and follow traffic and trail rules

#### **Bikers**

Follow car traffic rules including riding on the same side of the road as cars and obeying traffic lights and signs. Use a bell or your voice to warn walkers or bikers you are passing. Not warning has been a problem lately on our trail. On the Pinellas Trail, stay on the right and pass on the left of the biking lane. If you stop on the trail, don't block it for other riders or walkers. Children under 16 are required to wear helmets. Adults are advised to wear helmets. A headlight visible for 500 ft. and a rear reflector are required between sunset and sunrise.

#### **Drivers**

A walker or biker is no match for a car. Give bicyclists a minimum of 3 feet of clearance when passing and yield to a bicyclist in a bike lane or intersection.

#### Everyone

Don't walk/ride/drive with headphones or when texting so you can be alert to things happening around you. Be respectful and patient with those around you. If we each do our part, we will have a safer neighborhood and lower medical

# Neighbor Spotlight: Hugo and Anita Freudenthal



The story of Drs. Hugo and Anita Freudenthal is one of love, loyalty, hard work, in tellectual curiosity, and making their mark together in science and in their community.

Serendipity brought them together in 1954 when mutual friends thought they would be a perfect match as both were scientists. Anita had an M.A. from Hofstra University, was teaching at Adelphi University, and pursuing her PhD at NYU, all in Biology. Hugo was completing his M.S. in Pharmacology at Columbia. After several attempts, they finally met for their first date at the Metropolitan Opera. Their second date was square dancing and they've been dancing together ever since.

Sensibly they married the next June, considering they were both accepted into the prestigious graduate program at the Marine Biological Labs in Woods Hole, Massachusetts and of course, they were in love. Woods Hole made such an impact on Hugo that he joined Anita at NYU for his PhD in Marine Microbiology.

Things were busy for the Freudenthal family as their children Ellen and Richard were born, and Anita and Hugo completed their PhDs. As Associate Director of the American Museum of Natural History's research lab, Hugo was researching in New Zealand and discovered new strains

of an algae called zooxanthellae that lives with coral and other marine life. The new genus Freudenthalidium was named in his honor.

In the early 60's, Hugo and Anita pioneered marine science education. Hugo created the Marine & Environmental Sciences Program at Long Island University teaching for 40 years along with Anita, an Adjunct Professor in his program. While in this program, Hugo became Head of Life Sciences for a NASA subcontractor, where he developed the first space toilet for Skylab, and flew in zero gravity to refine astronaut needs for personal hygiene, food, exercise, and isolation.

Anita designed marine science courses for the New York State College of Agriculture and Technology and was the first marine biologist for Nassau County in Long Island. Anita's discovery of the stinging organisms that cause the rash called SeaBather's Eruption (sea lice) was published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*. New York's *Newsday* named her "Detective of the Seas" for her investigations.

Ellen and Richard fondly remember growing up with their parents doing experiments in the kitchen. They never knew what was edible and what was a science study. They also remember dad Hugo flying his plane from Long Island to Clearwater to visit Anita's parents here in Fairway Estates.

They traveled the U.S. in their RV: square dancing, attending science events, and enjoying air shows along the way. We have been lucky to have Hugo and Anita as neighbors since 2002 when they purchased a home down the street from Anita's parents.







# **History Is All Around Us**

# Our Famous Street Names - by Glen Gaither

#### Sarazen Drive



Gene Sarazen, one of the world's most famous golfers in the 20's and 30's, was an innovator and ambassador who changed the game. Sarazen won seven major championships and was the first one of only five men to accomplish the career grand slam, winning all four major tournaments at least once.

Born Eugenio Saraceni to Sicilian immigrants in New York, he changed his name because he

thought it sounded like a violinist. Sarazen, like other players of the day who came from humble beginnings, began as a caddy. He worked up to a club pro by his mid-teens and, in 1922 at only 19, he won the PGA Championship, and became a full time professional. Sarazen was the same age as Bobby Jones with whom he had a career-long rivalry. Battles between Jones, Sarazen and Walter Hagen--the game's three top players of the day-- expanded the popularity of golf worldwide.

Small in stature at only 5'5" tall, Sarazen was nevertheless known as one of the longest hitters of his era and was one of the earliest players to adopt the interlocking grip, now common. His innovations are widely seen. Taking a tip from baseball great Ty Cobb he developed a weighted practice club. While taking a flying lesson from Howard

Hughes he noticed that the tail of the plane adjusted downward during takeoff. This led to his invention of a club which became the modern sand wedge. The sand wedge and the technique for its use became widely adopted and revolutionized the short game.

But it was for a much longer shot with a four wood that Sarazen is most remembered. Sarazen hit the "shot heard round the world" on the fifteenth hole in the final round of the 1935 Masters Tournament at Augusta National Golf Club. Trailing at the time, he hit a 235 yard shot into the hole for a double eagle and tie for the lead. He went on to win the 36-hole playoff the following day. The feat still stands as one of the most famous shots in golf history and it helped popularize the Masters.

Sarazen continued to compete long beyond his prime. In 1973 at age 71 he made a hole-in-one at the Open Championship in Scotland. After retiring, he served as an honorary starter at the Masters for many years as well as joining Byron Nelson and Sam Snead in hitting a ceremonial tee shot before each tournament. He was also an early TV broadcaster and commentator on "The Wonderful World of Golf" and had what is still the longest-running endorsement contract in pro sports with Wilson Sporting Goods - 75 years. Sarazen was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 1974 and won the PGA's first Lifetime Achievement Award in 1996. Jack Nicklaus once called him "the cornerstone of the game we all enjoy today." He died at age 97 in Naples, FL, in 1999.

Amendment 1: Citizenship Requirement to Vote in Florida Elections

**Official Ballot Summary:** This amendment provides that only United States Citizens who are at least eighteen years of age, a permanent resident of Florida, and registered to vote, as provided by law, shall be qualified to vote in a Florida election.

# Amendment 2: Raising Florida's Minimum Wage

**Official Ballot Summary:** Raises minimum wage to \$10.00 per hour effective September 30th, 2021. Each September 30th thereafter, minimum wage shall increase by \$1.00 per hour until the minimum wage reaches \$15.00 per hour on September 30th, 2026. From that point forward, future minimum wage increases shall revert to being adjusted annually for inflation starting September 30th, 2027.

#### Amendment 3: All Voters Vote in Primary Elections for State Legislature, Governor, and Cabinet

**Official Ballot Summary:** Allows all registered voters to vote in primaries for state legislature, governor, and cabinet regardless of political party affiliation. All candidates for an office, including party nominated candidates, appear on the same primary ballot. Two highest vote getters advance to general election. If only two candidates qualify, no primary is held and winner is determined in general election. Candidate's party affiliation may appear on ballot as provided by law. Effective January 1, 2024.

#### **Amendment 4: Voter Approval of Constitutional Amendments**

**Official Ballot Summary:** Requires all proposed amendments or revisions to the state constitution to be approved by the voters in two elections, instead of one, in order to take effect. The proposal applies the current thresholds for passage to each of the two elections.

#### **Amendment 5: Limitation on Homestead Assessments**

**Official Ballot Summary:** Proposing an amendment to the State Constitution, effective date January 1, 2021, to increase, from 2 years to 3 years, the period of time during which accrued Save-Our-Homes benefits may be transferred from a prior homestead to a new homestead.

Amendment 6: Ad Valorem Tax Discount for Spouses of Certain Deceased Veterans Who Had Permanent, Combat-Related Disabilities Official Ballot Summary: Provides that the homestead property tax discount for certain veterans with permanent combat-related disabilities carries over to such veteran's surviving spouse who holds legal or beneficial title to, and who permanently resides on, the homestead property, until he or she remarries or sells or otherwise disposes of the property. The discount may be transferred to a new homestead property of the surviving spouse under certain conditions. The amendment takes effect January 1, 2021.
