## **Officers Reports:**

## Secretary's Report – Ed Kelb

- Motion made by Kelly Dixon to waive reading of the March 2023 FECA Board Meeting minutes.
   2<sup>nd</sup> by Kathy O'Leary. Motion carried.
- Motion made by Kelly Dixon to accept the March 2023 FECA Board Meeting minutes "as written". 2<sup>nd</sup> by Kathy O'Leary. Motion carried.

## <u>Treasurer's Report – Kelly Dixon</u>

- Refer to full reports online.
- An additional \$550 was deposited for annual dues payments in March. The Treasurer has
  three more payments ready to deposit in April. This places FECA at 367 paid homeowners
  (71.4%). At this time last year, FECA had received 371 payments (72.2%). The 2023 FECA
  Budget was based on a minimum of 370 payments (\$20,350). Recap of dues totals for the last
  three years:

0	2021	384 homeowners	74.7%
0	2020	385 homeowners	74.9%

- As discussed at the March Board Meeting, the Treasurer sent an email reminder to those who
  haven't paid (if FECA had an email address).
- The Treasurer initiated a discussion regarding the 147 FE homeowners who have not paid dues in 2023. The FECA Board would like to better understand why some homeowners choose not to participate. The consensus was that it might prove beneficial to establish a small online survey and then reach out to these homeowners (via USPS mail) to ask them if they would fill out the survey. The survey could be kept anonymous to encourage even homeowners with negative responses to participate.
  - Motion from Vice President Derrick Beland to proceed with the mail/survey option detailed above. 2<sup>nd</sup> from Don Lemmon. Motion carried. Kelly Dixon will circle back with President Todd Brooks to work out the details.

- Another \$100 in sponsorship money for FECA events was donated totaling \$670 YTD.
- Food for the 2023 Spring Fling was paid for at \$215 out of a budget of \$550.
  - Note: The Dixon's personally paid out \$430 for content in the goody bags for children. Due to low attendance by kids, only half of the goody bags were given out at the Spring Fling. Kelly may use the remainder for personal business use. FECA wishes to express our gratitude to the Dixon's for their ongoing financial and personal support. Neighbors like Kelly and Gregg Dixon are two of the reasons that *Fairway Estates* remains the <u>BEST</u> neighborhood in Dunedin.
- The spring garage sale ad was paid.
- Betsy Morgan was reimbursed for the DCO luncheons and her DCO annual membership fee has been paid.
- Routine Watering, Electric, Lawn & Lake maintenance were paid.
- In 2023, President Todd Brooks began his first term as FECA president. **Treasurer Kelly Dixon** and Todd both went to the bank and had him added to the FECA accounts.
- As approved at the March Board Meeting, the **Treasurer opened a 1-year CD for \$10,000. The** rate will be 4%.
- Motion made by Derrick Beland to accept the April 2023 FECA Treasurer Report "as written".
   2<sup>nd</sup> by Kathy O'Leary. Motion carried.

## Vice President's Report - Derrick Beland

#### President's Report – Todd Brooks

 Meeting lengths have been gradually increasing as involvement in neighborhood and community affairs increases. In an attempt to keep monthly Board meetings concise and to the point, Todd is asking FECA Committee Chairs to limit the material reviewed to those items where the Chair is looking for feedback. As committees are autonomous and many activities don't require Board approval, the President is asking to reduce the amount of time spent reviewing such activities.

## Nominating Committee - Commentary from President Todd Brooks

 Two individuals have approached Todd regarding this open Committee position. Todd is reviewing specifics related to the By-Laws and how the nomination process should flow. This discussion will continue in future Board meetings.

## Newsletter - Kathy O'Leary

• To reduce mailing and publishing expenses, the Newsletter Team has been encouraging homeowners to migrate from the hardcopy version over to the online version of the FECA Newsletter. As of this point in time, 117 hardcopy newsletters are being mailed out three times a year. Of those 117, only 34 are "dues paying" FECA members. There is no intent to make any changes at this time; however, Kathy would like to keep this topic open for discussion when Board meetings reconvene after summer break. This would also allow us time to review some of the feedback from the survey mentioned in the Treasurer's section (above).

## **Non-Board Member Committee Reports:**

## **Beautification – Update from President Todd Brooks**

- President Todd Brooks coordinated a "flowerbed Cleanup" day on March 18<sup>th</sup> where FECA
  Board and Committee members as well as residents participated. Todd noted that the event
  went extremely well and significant progress was made to spruce up the beds at the Brady
  entrances, the Palm Blvd entrances as well as the Lake Saundra Park beds.
- FECA is still looking for a candidate who can serve as chairperson to coordinate similar events.

## <u>City Liaison – Betsy Morgan</u>

- Betsy was unable to attend the *Dunedin Council of Organizations* meetings held on March 12<sup>th</sup>,
   2023, but provided a summary based on meeting notes and the City Calendar.
- The featured speaker was from the *Scottish American Society of Dunedin*. They are celebrating their 40th anniversary this year. Their website (<a href="http://sas-dunedin.org">http://sas-dunedin.org</a>) details upcoming events like whiskey tastings and music events.
- The new *Dunedin City Hall* is now open and operational. 39,000 Square feet housing 100 employees and offers parking for 218 vehicles. Funding for the building was mostly from *Penny for Pinellas* with help from CRA, utilities and building permit fees. Consistent with the city's EPIC goal for environmental sustainability, the new City Hall has solar power and a standby generator. Hours are 8-5 M-F.
- A recognition ceremony was held on March 20<sup>th</sup> at the *Dunedin Golf Club* for the recently painted turtle and tortoise (Henry and Silvia) on the water tower. Henry Scharrer was a Swiss immigrant and nature lover who lived on Caladesi island from 1892 to 1934. Sylvia Earle was an oceanographer who was raised in Dunedin. The breakout Turtle design by Tom Stovall of St. Petersburg is intended to provide Dunedin citizens a striking and meaningful environmental portrait that encourages protection and survival of sea tortoises and gopher turtles.
- The *Highland Games* are scheduled to take place on April 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **New Residents - Deb Timko**

- Deb Timko spoke over the phone with Vincent and Katrine Elia who are in the process of relocating to FE from PA. Upon relocation, a member of the New Residents Team will visit and provide them with a FECA Welcome Packet.
- Appreciation to Betsy Morgan (City Liaison Chairperson) for providing safety pamphlets
  published by the City of Dunedin (bicycle safety, etc.) These will be added to the welcome
  packets given to all new homeowners.

## Lake Saundra – Dave Lindsey

- Dave took an eighth sampling from Lake Saundra (completed each month). As this is the dry season for Dunedin, pollen has been accumulating. With the recent storm, pollen surrounding the lake has drained into the lake. This was visibly noticeable during sampling because water samples needed to be manually pushed through a filtering mechanism.
- Pickerelweed (beneficial to the lake) is thriving in certain areas and lake wildlife is noticeable around it.



• Within the lake, there are instances of an undesirable plant species called papyrus. This species can be very difficult to control and propagates quickly:





Dave continues to work with Dan Willin of <u>Florida LAKEWATCH - The University of Florida</u>.
 LAKEWATCH typically waits until they obtain a full years' worth of samplings before providing findings; however, Dave did inquire as to what our samplings might be indicating thus far.
 Basically, Lake Saundra is in pretty good condition and reflective of the geological substrate for this region. Phosphorus and Nitrogen levels are where we would expect them to be. This is great news (thus far) and FECA wishes to express our gratitude to Dave for his extensive efforts to ensure Lake Saundra remains healthy and attractive to wildlife.

## **Events:**


- Spring Fling March 25<sup>th</sup>
  - The Spring Fling was a success with all attendees having a great time. Except for some occasional wind gusts, the weather cooperated. As anticipated, the turnout for this FECA event was somewhat lower than other festivals held throughout the year.

## **Old Business:**

## Palm Blvd: Breaker Panel Requires Replacement - Ed Kelb

As discussed in previous Board meetings, the breaker panel located in the center of Palm Blvd has significantly deteriorated. Half of the panel bottom has rusted away. The breaker panel requires replacement.

Having provided the lowest estimate (\$950), *Buell Electric* was dispatched to perform the following work on April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2023:



Upon further inspection, the technician realized that ... in addition to the rusted out breaker panel ... the box which holds the electrical meter for Duke (see pic above) has also rusted completely though. As a certified electrician cannot knowingly leave a worksite with a hazardous or dangerous situation, he was forced to terminate his work and provide FECA a revised estimate. Unfortunately, replacement of the meter box requires permits and coordination with *Duke Electric* to power off (and on) the circuit from the transformer. This resulted in a revised estimate that tripled the cost (see Exhibit A) to \$2,775.

Therefore, the current lowest estimate has shifted to **Dunedin Electric (see Exhibit B) at a cost of \$1,900 with permits.** 

Vice President Derrick Beland requested a two-week delay before proceeding (with Dunedin Electric). He would like the opportunity to contact *Tesla Electric* for a possible 3<sup>rd</sup> estimate. As this might create a timing conflict with upcoming surgery for project lead Ed Kelb, Vice President Derrick Beland has volunteered to step in and complete the project (if necessary).

Motion from Ed Kelb to wait until April 26<sup>th</sup> to secure a 3<sup>rd</sup> bid, then reach out via E-Mail to the Board to provide an update and reach an agreement to proceed with the lowest estimate. Should Ed Kelb be unable to complete this for personal reasons,
 Derrick Beland will step in to follow though. 2<sup>nd</sup> from Matt Stevens. Motion carried.

Matt Stevens will wrap the electrical service in caution tape to provide some warning to anyone who might be in the vicinity of the equipment.

## Monument Sign Discoloration (Sarazen Dr and Brady Dr) – Matt Stevens

- Board Member Matt Stevens noted that the Brady signs are not aluminum, but some fibrous material. Another sign company indicated to Matt that this type of sign has a limited lifespan of 3-4 years. The FECA Board was not notified of the difference in sign composition (Brady vs Palm) or lifespan when the signs were replaced in 2019-2020.
- The FECA Board is faced with a decision to either replace the Brady monuments with signs of a comparable material (and lifespan) versus a more durable sign. Matt Stevens will attempt to secure quotes for both options.
- Should raised lettering be considered for the replacement signs?

#### Protection of Magnolia Tree at Lake Saundra Park – Matt Stevens

- As noted last month, Board Member Matt Stevens would like to attempt a three-tiered approach:
  - 1) Signage
  - 2) If not effective, add cameras.
  - 3) If not effective, add fencing around the tree.
- Quotes are being obtained for two signs to be placed at Lake Saundra Park. Discussion will continue next month.

## Speeding and failure to stop in Fairway Estates – Don Lemmon

- On reached out to PCSO Lieutenant Tim Kelly on Wednesday, March 29<sup>th</sup>. Because of limited personnel, it isn't practical to place PCSO officers on various FE streets for an extended basis. To accumulate data for situations like "speeding in FE", PCSO utilizes "stealth" boxes which can be installed to monitor vehicle speeds and the number of vehicles travelling on a specific street. This approach might be a more practical way to get a handle on the extent of this issue. PCSO typically collects a week's worth of data.
- One of these devices was recently utilized on Palm Blvd. Of 2,067 vehicles monitored,
   17 were significantly over the posted speed limit of 25 mph.

30-35 mph 16 vehicles35-40 mph 1 vehicle

On drove around the city and noted at least eight speed bumps installed in different areas. He feels that speed bumps should not be ruled out prematurely; however, at this time, speed bumps are not on the agenda. The immediate intent is to gather more information using PCSO's "stealth" boxes.

## • Flooding at Hagan Ave and Mangrum Ave

- Board member Ed Kelb has reached out a second time to the City of Dunedin using a
  different Email address (to rule out problems with spam filters). Additionally, Ed left a
  voice mail requested these individuals check their respective inboxes. Hoping to have
  more information at the May meeting.
- Should we receive no reply from the city, the Board will draft a letter for the homeowner(s) at that corner to let them know that the Board has attempted to bring the problem to the city's attention, and the homeowner could proceed in their own behalf should they choose to do so.



#### • FECA Website Administration – Todd Brooks

 Todd Brooks initiated a motion that Website Administration be established as a new FECA committee. 2<sup>nd</sup> from Ed Kelb. Some follow-up discussion related to the submission, approval, and publication of material for <a href="http://fairwayestates.org">http://fairwayestates.org</a>
 Motion carried.

## Pedestrian Safety – Kathy O'Leary

- Kathy O'Leary reached out to a sign production company and determined that the
  cost for 18" x 24" yard signs would be approximately \$20 each. These would be of
  a quality similar to political campaign signs.
- The Board was asked to put some thought into streets and neighbors who might be willing to post these periodically. Discussion to continue at a later meeting.

## **New Business:**

## Resident Advertising Signs at Lake Saundra Park – Todd Brooks

A FE resident had placed a handmade sign advertising products or services they offer.
 This is strictly prohibited per published FECA Common Area Use Guidelines. #### Prohibited conduct

No person shall do any of the following in Lake Saundra Park or common areas:

- Climb or lie upon any tree, shrub, fence, monuments.
- (2) Use any area for changing clothing, other than an area designated for that purpose.
- Disregard the notices, prohibitions or directions on any park sign.
- (4) Place or display any sign or advertisement, except that this rule shall not apply to any signs or advertisements regarding any FECA sponsored or authorized event..
- (5) Knowingly, or through reckless behavior, destroy or damage the lawn, plants, or other infrastructure.
- (6) Use a park bench for other than its intended use and/or purpose.

- Deteriorating Park Bench Supports at Lake Saundra Park Matt Stevens
  - Matt Stevens reported significant rusting and corrosion of the metal supports for all four Lake Saundra Park benches. One bench has deteriorated to the point of being a hazard. This bench has been temporarily removed. Matt will research costs for various types of replacement supports.

## Resident's comments (post meeting):

- Resident Dave Lindsey brought to our attention that the city will be providing free trees to city residents (quantity limited) in celebration of Arbor Day.
- Resident Don Lemmon wanted the Board to know that he would be willing to serve as a liaison to the Dunedin Golf Club during the ongoing renovation scheduled to begin spring 2024. Todd Brooks will be following up with Don on the possibility of establishing such a position or committee.
